Warleiti Jap won both Plant of the Night and Popular Choice with this large eye catching *Den*. Fire Wings plant (below). Congratulations!



This Dendrobium hybrid is an intersectional variety with 75% of its genes from the section Latouria (also known as New Guinea Dendrobiums) and 25% from the section Phalaenopsis. The flowers are particularly large and long lasting. They can bloom twice a year, and each cane may have up to 10-15 spikes. They require careful attention but are generally very sturdy. Provide a moderately warm, humid, and spacious, airy environment to help it thrive.

Current Developments in Multi-Flora Paph. Hybrids

Many thanks to Howard Tan for this excellent information about multi-floral breeding trends.

In 2018, we discussed recent multi-floral development trends using the newly found *Paphiopedilum gigantifolium* and new forms of *Paphiopedilum anitum* and *Paphiopedilum adductum*. The most commonly used species on multi-floral breeding come from Section Coryopedilum. From my own observation of breeding lines, the principal species used all come from Subgenus Paphiopedilum, Section Coryopedilum. They are:

Paphiopedilum philippinense

Paphiopedilum rothschildianum

Paphiopedilum stonei

Paphiopedilum sanderianum

Paphiopedilum adductum

Paphiopedilum anitum

According to some taxonomists, Paphiopedilum adductum is the species and Paphiopedilum anitum is only a variety. Paphiopedilum adductum Asher 1983 was initially introduced to cultivation in 1980 as Paphiopedilum elliotianum before its currently accepted identification by Asher was published. It is listed as critically endangered as much of its Philippines habitat has been lost. Paphiopedilum anitum, Golamco, sp. Nov. 1998 is not accepted by Kew or RHS as it is considered to be Paphiopedilum adductum var. anitum (Golamco) Koop, Orchid Digest 64:157 (2000). When compared with Paphiopedilum adductum, it has intense and striking large flowers carried on inflorescences of up to 1m in length. It was initially found in a small isolated forest on Mindanao Island, facing the Pacific Ocean. The total population was estimated at that time to be only a few thousand plants, and the location has remained a carefully guarded secret to deter illegal collection. It is listed as critically endangered. These two species, now so integral to breeding programs, continue to fuel debate amongst taxonomists with some accepting the Kew classification and others rejecting the Kew position.

Further fuel has been added recently by the discovery of a more intensely coloured form of Paphiopedilum adductum that caries 3-4 smaller, very dark colour flowers. As often occurs, this new variant was available in the black market before being properly analysed and described. It may in fact be a new variant, or a new species. So Paphiopedilum rothschildianum x adductum which has been named as Paphiopedilum Johanna Burkhardt remains the same as before though the more recently bred Paphiopedilum Johanna Burkhardt is a primary hybrid between Paphiopedilum rothschildianum and the more recently discovered darker form of Paphiopedilum adductum. In an email discussion with Julian Shaw, Principal Registrar of RHS, he told me that it is a big problem that he is not prepared to take on yet. His advice to me was "just enjoy your collection." Last year I mentioned and showed photos of Paphiopedilum gigantifolium x anitum (it was called Paphiopedilum Haur Jih Lucky), but when I later checked Orchid Wiz, I noted that it was in fact registered by O. Gruss in 2015 as Paphiopedilum Wossner Giganitum.
